The Project: Specialist Domestic and Family Violence Programs National Open Grant Round

- In 2023, the Paul Ramsay Foundation partnered with the Australian Communities Foundation.
- Together, they created a Specialist Domestic and Family Violence Programs National Open Grant Round.
- A total of \$13.6 million in funding was awarded to 58 organisations working with domestic and family violence. 58 organisations received funding. Of these, 27 organisations were First Nations specialist domestic and family violence service providers. All 27 organisations are community-controlled organisations. Your organisation was one of the 27.
- We are ResearchCrowd an independent, Supply Nation certified Indigenous research agency. We were engaged by the Paul Ramsay Foundation to act as a learning partner to all 27 community-controlled organisations.
- Innovation Unit, a non-First Nations social enterprise were engaged by the Paul Ramsay Foundation to act as a learning partner to the 31 non-First Nations led specialist domestic and family violence service providers that also received funding.
- ResearchCrowd and Innovation Unit met to share insights from our respective learning partners.
- The Paul Ramsay Foundation were interested to learn more about the following two questions:
 - What is the landscape of the specialist domestic and family violence sector?
 - What are the possible systemic moves that need to happen?
- Our final report *Potential for Change* is guided by the principles of cultural safety and self-determination. It is about systemic change and influence in the domestic and family violence sector. It promotes the work of community-controlled organisations and the Paul Ramsay Foundation in growing their knowledges, sector relationships and plans for future work.

The research was conducted from 1 June 2023 to 30 June 2024.

Recovery Program Healing Your Heart, Healing Your Mind Program Paul Ramsay Foundation asked us to use 'systems change' to learn about what's happening in the domestic and family violence sector.



What are systems?

This is how Kristy Muir, CEO of the Paul Ramsay Foundation, explained systems:

Systems are complex – there are many parts that play different roles, the parts are interdependent, the whole is greater than the sum of its parts, there are many interacting feedback loops where the behaviour of one part affects other parts (whether it is intended or not), they like balance and will resist change and struggle with unintended consequences. If this isn't complex enough, there are systems within systems. (Muir, 2024, para.10)

We used the Water of Systems Change.

The Water of Systems Change is all about examining, analysing and identifying root causes that can hold complex problems in place.


The Water of Systems Change provides a way into seeing and understanding the landscape of the domestic and family violence sector, its complex problems and possible systemic moves that need to happen to realise the potential for change.

Seeing and understanding policies, practices, resource flows, relationships, connections, power dynamics, and deeply held beliefs, assumptions, taken-for-granted ways of operating that influence how we think, what we do, and how we talk.

The Water of Systems Change was created by John Kania, Mark Kramer and Peter Senge in 2018 to support foundations involved in systems change to increase their odds for success.

This is the Water of Systems Change model.

Six Conditions of Systems Change


